
garden used by the incumbent tenant of the mill, and cut down the black poplar with its Rogation crosses<sup>10</sup> which marked the bounds. The reaction of Butley folk was of outrage and they loaded on a wagon a large stone (doubtless taken from the Priory ruins) and positioned it where the roots of the felled poplar could still be seen. They lost their battle and in time the new boundary became accepted, as it is today.

So far, so good. The conflation of Chillesford and Butley in the name of the new mill 'Butley Mill alias Chillesford Mill' is explained, but how does 'Carlton' come to be included?

## **Carlton Mill**

The survey of Butley, Boyton and Tangham by Radulph Agas in 1594 has clues to the former existence of a mill in the vicinity of Stonebridge Marsh<sup>11</sup>.
